Making Progress!

The **\$101K for the 101** Campaign is making progress. Contractors from Ironhorse Rail worked very hard this past fall on the WDM's short line track.

This is a major project - levelling, laying new ties, correcting angles, replacing rail, pounding spikes and putting down truckload after truckload of gravel. WDM Chief Engineer Tim Pomeroy brought in an experienced railway inspector once the work was completed.

"We walked every inch of the new track and the inspector made a handful of recommendations to address," Tim said. "I am very pleased to report that all of those minor issues have been brought up to standard and we have a train-worthy track at the WDM Moose Jaw."

What's next for the 101? We still want to build a tunnel for the train to run through that will do double-duty as a storage shed during the operating season. That will keep the train secure and protected from the elements, ensuring it is in great shape for years to come.

We also need volunteers. "Volunteers are the heart of the 101," says Kathy Fitton, WDM Moose Jaw Manager. "Qualified and trained engineers and firemen to run the train for our visitors, conductors, ticket takers - we are looking forward to getting our experienced

101 volunteers back to work and to welcoming new volunteers for next year and the years to come." Once the infrastructure is in place, the only limit to how often the train can run is the people power to do it.

The **\$101K for the 101** Campaign will provide a fund to support volunteer recruitment and training so we have enough volunteers to keep the Vulcan running as often as possible. Moose Jaw and steam train fans have been waiting a long time for this, we want to be able to give as many people as possible the unique experience of the feeling of steam.
