## A MESSAGE FROM THE CEO *By Joan Champ*

The Western Development Museum is a special place. It is a place where memories begin – where memories are preserved, where memories are shared, and where new memories are made. Since 1949, it has been the WDM's job to save and share the fascinating stories that make up Saskatchewan's unique heritage.

This important role is not without its challenges. The WDM could not survive without the sustaining support of the Government of Saskatchewan for nearly 80 percent (\$4,181,000) of its annual operating budget. The remaining 20 percent (about \$1 million) required to maintain the Museum's exhibits, programs and services comes from self-generated revenue. This includes revenue from admission fees, gift shop sales, food services and facility rentals. It also includes donations from supporters like you.

Donations to the WDM, a registered charity, ensure that the Museum can keep telling Saskatchewan's stories. Money raised for the WDM is used to create and maintain engaging exhibits in all four of our museums. Gifts to the Museum support the conservation and restoration of artifacts that bring Saskatchewan's history to life. They also support the development of educational programs that tell our stories to school groups and visitors from near and far.

### WAYS TO HELP

There are many ways to help the WDM and all support is greatly appreciated. In addition to cash donations, the WDM has put into place a number of other methods for accepting gifts. The WDM recently established the Museum Legacy Fund at the Saskatoon Community Foundation. An endowed gift (or endowment) of sufficient size will generate annual interest that can be used to support Museum activities. These gifts are held in perpetuity. Here are some other gifting options:

- The WDM has recently set up a brokerage account at its bank. A donation-in-kind of publicly traded securities is a simple way to support the Museum and may be 100% tax creditable.

- The gift of an existing or new life insurance policy, or the naming of the WDM as a beneficiary, has positive tax implications for donors and their estates.

- The bequest of a specific sum or percentage of an estate through a person's will leaves a legacy of support for the next generation of families who visit the WDM.

- Many WDM supporters choose to make a special donation in memory of a loved one, recognizing that the legacy of the past is the foundation for a sustainable future.

- Various sponsorship opportunities are also available for WDM exhibits, programs and events.

All gifts to the WDM are personally and gratefully acknowledged when they are received. For gifts that require careful planning and decision-making, donors are encouraged to contact their professional financial advisor(s) to discuss their options and giving intentions. 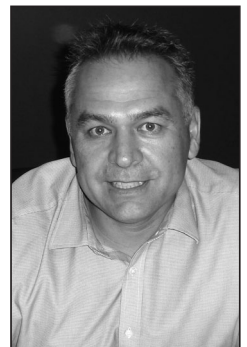

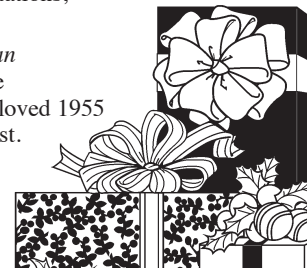
