A MESSAGE FROM THE CEO



Partnerships Benefit Everyone

As we head into fall, I hope everyone had a wonderful summer. As always, it's been a busy summer with the WDM's camp programs, summer shows and many visiting friends and families coming out to enjoy a day at our Museums. Work on the parking lot in Saskatoon started a bit later than originally planned, but we are making progress, and everyone is looking forward to having all the repairs completed.

So much of what happens at the WDM is a result of tremendous community support and we are fortunate to be working with some great community partners. In education, we have been working closely with the Saskatchewan Environmental Society and Agriculture in the Classroom to give students great hands-on learning opportunities within exhibits specifically designed for these programs. We are also pleased to be able to host the exhibit *They Were There...Over There*. Currently on display at the WDM Saskatoon, this exhibit draws on the rich and diverse collection of the Saskatoon Museum of Military Artifacts and tells the story of the Great War and the role played by two Saskatoon men in the conflict.

The WDM has also entered into a partnership with Spirit Wrestler Productions, a non-profit organization dedicated to preserving the history of the Doukhobor community, and Dr. A. Androsoff, a Doukhobor historian from the University of Saskatchewan, on an exciting new project to preserve the spiritual traditions of the Saskatchewan Doukhobor community. The project consists of three components: a documentary film, a soundscape created by Spirit Wrestler Productions, and an exhibit produced by the WDM. The audio and video captured from the prayer service is being used to create an immersive soundscape experience that will allow audience members to hear how the Doukhobors' multi-part harmonies combine to create the distinctive sound of their choral tradition. When completed, the soundscape and exhibit will be on display in Saskatoon.

Partnerships are very important to the work of the WDM and we are grateful to be able to work with organizations that share the same passion for Saskatchewan's culture and heritage.

Partners in Education

We can't say enough about the tremendous support we get from schools around the province. We are grateful to have teachers and school administrators who value and support the programs the WDM offers. But did you know that our school programs get support from others in the community as well? The WDM is fortunate to have a number of community partners who offer, not only financial support, but also expertise that enriches what we offer to schools.

For over five years, the WDM has partnered with the Saskatchewan Environmental Society to offer *Smarter Science Better Buildings*. Offered at all WDM locations, this program connects to the Grade 7 science curriculum through hands-on learning about energy efficiency. Last year, SaskEnergy came on board sponsoring a subsidy to assist some schools with transportation costs. Thanks to SaskEnergy over 1,000 more students were able to take part in this program. Coming in November, this program will be offered in Prince Albert thanks to the support of the group, Renewable Power Intelligent Choice.

The *Seed Survivor/Explore Ag* display and program will be returning to the WDM Saskatoon in September thanks to Nutrien and Agriculture in the Classroom Saskatchewan (AITC). Since 2016, students from Grades 3-6 have learned about where food comes from through Nutrien's *Seed Survivor* display. Staff from AITC facilitate the program which includes hands-on displays and a Museum tour. Thanks to Nutrien's support, this program is offered at no charge to schools.

Federated Co-op will be covering fuel costs for the engines operating in the 44th annual *Grade 4 Harvest Demonstration* at the WDM Saskatoon. Since 1975, over 100,000 Grade 4 students have learned about farm life in Saskatchewan.

Thanks to all our partners who work with the WDM so that we can continue to bring curriculum connected learning opportunities to Saskatchewan students.

New to the WDM Collection

This summer, our *New to the WDM Collection* Facebook posts featured four unique wedding dresses, acquired in 2016. While alone each of these dresses are beautiful examples of the fashions of the day, together they represent something much more, showcasing the love stories of four generations of brides in one Saskatchewan family.

In 1913, Marie Epp married John Fisher near Rosthern. She wore a delicate short-sleeved silk chiffon wedding dress. Marie's sister also married that day, making for a double wedding. The sisters wore matching dresses. Marie and John were married for 55 years.

In 1943, John Fisher gave his daughter Alvera \$20 to buy a dress for her upcoming marriage to Elmer Bartel. Alvera bought an elegant long-sleeved dress with embroidered bronze details at the shoulders made of cream triple sheer rayon at Adilman's in Saskatoon. It cost \$14.95. The wedding was held at the Eigenheim Mennonite Church near Rosthern, and guests enjoyed a reception of homemade food. They were married for 61 years.

By the time Alvera's daughter Marilyn was planning her wedding it was 1963. Marilyn noticed a dress in a store window on 2nd Avenue in Saskatoon when she and Alvera went shopping. She tried it on and knew it was the one. It cost about \$100. Marilyn married Allan Jensen on July 5 that year. The reception was held at 33rd Street United Church in Saskatoon where guests were served turkey dinner. The couple was married for over 50 years.

In 1985, Marilyn's daughter Bonnie, was getting ready for her wedding to Ron Thibodeau. Bonnie chose a Bridallure long-sleeved white lace wedding dress at Debra Dee's in Saskatoon. 72 years after her great-grandmother got married in a simple chiffon dress, Bonnie's many layers of lace symbolized how much the styles had changed.

Each bride and her daughter lovingly preserved their dresses. Thanks to their preservation efforts, future generations can now reflect on how women in Saskatchewan have experienced love and marriage over the last 100 years. Follow us on Facebook for more stories like these.
