

The WDM Through the Years

1975 - 1999

As the WDM marks our 75th anniversary in 2024, we've been looking back over our long history. Welcome to the second part of our three-part series sharing the history of the WDM. In this issue, we look at 1975 – 99 when the WDM opens our fourth location, continues to add exhibits and programs and celebrated our 50th anniversary.

By 1975, the WDM had grown from airport hangars crammed with artifacts to three purpose-built museums and, in the case of North Battleford and Yorkton, with a sizeable amount of land for programs and exhibits. Construction of the WDM Moose Jaw was an exciting time as plans were made for this new museum to house some of the WDM's largest artifacts — planes, trains and automobiles. As the building neared completion, artifacts were moved from WDM's in Saskatoon and North Battleford where they would be displayed in land, water, rail and air transportation galleries. On June 26, 1976, the WDM Moose Jaw opened on Diefenbaker Drive with Premier Allan Blakeney on hand for the ribbon cutting. WDM Board Chair George Dyck declared that "the highlight of the year was the official opening of the Moose Jaw Transportation Museum."

The WDM introduced one of its first formal school programs — the Grade 4 Harvest Demonstration in 1975. In response to requests from teachers, the WDM Saskatoon partnered with Saskatoon Public Schools to offer the program. In 2000, the WDM North Battleford

began offering the program as well. From 1975 – 2019, over 100,000 Saskatchewan Grade 4 students were educated about early Saskatchewan farming through this program. Over the years, the WDM has offered and continues to offer a wide variety of curriculum-connected school programs on topics ranging from transportation to holiday traditions to building energy efficient homes.

In 1980, as part of celebrations marking Saskatchewan's 75th anniversary as a province, the WDM took on a project to recognize Saskatchewan innovators. Made In Saskatchewan exhibits for each Museum were researched, designed and built to showcase patented Saskatchewan inventions from 1905 — 80. To accompany the exhibits, an index of Saskatchewan inventions was printed. The Saskatchewan Innovations — Patent Index features an amazing variety of devices — everything from kitchen gadgets and personal gear to agricultural and industrial equipment. Each item speaks to the creativeness and ingenuity of Saskatchewan people. You can view the index at wdm.ca/special_feature/saskatchewan-innovations.

The WDM staged one of its most ambitious programs in 1982. Colony Trek was an 11-day wagon trek from Moose Jaw to Saskatoon. It was organized to commemorate the 1882 trek of Temperance Colony Society settlers from the end of the rail line at Moose Jaw to their new townsite at Saskatoon. Months of planning preceded the event. The oldest trekker was 82 years, the youngest was four. Over 30 wagons with 205 participants from across western Canada

and some from Nova Scotia, along with 140 horses, re-enacted the 260 km journey of the Temperance Colonists. A 30-minute documentary was filmed and aired nationally on CBC. Later that year, the documentary won a Golden Sheaf in the Human Dynamics category at the Yorkton Film Festival and the Saskatchewan Cable Television Association award for the best video production in Saskatchewan.

By the early 1980s, more space was needed for Curatorial staff and for storage. To this point, Curatorial staff were working out of the WDM Saskatoon. In 1984, the WDM Provincial Service Centre opened in Saskatoon. The 12,077 square metre building provided a new home for artifacts that were being stored in the Second World War hangars which had been in use since the 1940s. By 1987, the WDM vacated the last off-site storage hangar.

The Provincial Service Centre also housed administration offices, collections, exhibits and research, the Dr. George Shepherd Library as well as shop space for exhibit construction and training courses. In 1993, a conservation lab was added to better care for artifacts. At the time, it was one of the largest conservation labs in Canada. Also in 1993, the Provincial Service Centre was renamed the WDM Curatorial Centre to better reflect the museum functions of artifact collection, conservation and exhibit design. In 2018, the WDM Curatorial Centre was renamed as the WDM Corporate Office to reflect the curatorial and administrative functions that take place there.

In 1988, the WDM offered our first Introduction to Blacksmithing Course. Designed and led by blacksmith and WDM Exhibits Coordinator, Rick Dixon, and organized by Leslee Newman, it

was originally thought the course would be offered once or twice and that would be it. Little did they know that the course would still be going strong in 2024 and would prove to be one of the most popular courses offered by the WDM. Offered from the WDM Corporate Office, the course has taught the art of blacksmithing to over 1,000 people, ages 16 to 65+. In 2023, the course received Heritage Saskatchewan's Heritage Award in the category of Living Heritage.

The mid-1980s through the mid-1990s was a time of change for the WDM. The Museum saw a decrease in the annual grant from the provincial government in 1987. This led to a decision to reduce hours of operation and close the WDMs Moose Jaw, North Battleford and Yorkton from October through April. These winter closures would continue until the mid-1990s. Fortunately, the WDM was able to secure grants from other sources so that some improvements could still

take place. New permanent exhibits, the British Commonwealth Air Training Plan Gallery and the Snowbirds Gallery, were added at the WDM Moose Jaw. The Heritage Village in North Battleford grew with the addition of a 1928 Saskatchewan Wheat Pool Elevator from Keatley in 1983. In 1986 and 1987, a barn and farmhouse were added to create a farmstead. With the addition of the farm, the theme of the WDM North Battleford was updated to the Heritage Farm and Village.

In 1995, the WDM received a major donation to the artifact collection. The artifact donation told the story of the Bladon family, a couple and their seven children who farmed near Lang from 1910 – 95. The family members were savers. Five of the seven children lived in the family home for their whole lives. The donation included over 200 toys in pristine condition. The exhibit, In A Prairie Attic: Bladon Family Toys, was created and provides a fascinating look at prairie childhood in the early decades of the 20th century. The exhibit opened in March 1997 and is on display at the WDM Yorkton.

With the end of the century looming, focus turned toward the WDM's 50th anniversary in 1999. To mark this anniversary, from October 1998 and running throughout 1999, a series of articles written and prepared by Leslee Newman and Noelle Grosse appeared in weekly newspapers in Yorkton, Saskatoon and Regina. The articles featured interesting stories about artifacts from the WDM Collection. In 2001, these articles were compiled into the book, Museum Gold – Treasures From The Collection.

The WDM also celebrated by holding public open houses in April 1999. The week of April 11 – 17, 1999 was declared WDM Week in Saskatchewan and the cities of Saskatoon and Yorkton also declared WDM Week. A gala dinner took place in November which featured the unveiling of a 50th anniversary souvenir book highlighting WDM artifacts, themes and activities.

Stay tuned for the next issue of *Sparks* when we head into a new millennium and prepare to recognize Saskatchewan's 100th anniversary as a province.



Volunteering for Over 50 Years

"The WDM has been a big part of our lives."

Can you imagine volunteering at the same place for over 50 years? That is what the remarkable Art Vessey has been doing at the WDM Saskatoon. Art grew up in Murray Harbour, PEI so what is it about the WDM that attracted him?

Let's start with how Art got here. In 1955, Art moved to Regina as part of his military service. It was in Regina that he met his future wife, Dorothy. They hit it off and it wasn't long before Art decided to stay and start a new life in Saskatchewan. The young couple settled in Saskatoon.

Around 1965, Art and Dorothy attended Pion-Era at the WDM Saskatoon. They both loved the atmosphere. A couple of years later, Art and co-worker James "Goldie" DeWitt decided to check out WDM volunteer opportunities as they thought it looked interesting. After helping out here and there, Art decided to join the Pioneer Threshermen's Club (PTC), a WDM Saskatoon volunteer group, in January 1970. He immediately enrolled in the WDM's steam traction engine operation course. By June, Art was a licensed steam engine operator and that summer he was able to help out on his favourite steam engine, the Shady Rumely (WDM-1973-S-233). From that point on Art was hooked on the WDM.

During the 1970s, Art took part in a wide variety of volunteer activities. When WDM staffer Fred Leigh wanted to build a sawmill, he sought advice from Art who had worked in a sawmill in PEI. Art was very involved with harvest demonstrations including threshing competitions

where teams of five people using horses, a threshing machine and a steam engine would see who could gather and thresh grain in the fastest time. In 1975, Art's threshing crew represented Saskatchewan at the World Threshing Championships in Milton, Ontario. Despite very wet weather, the Saskatchewan team won the competition. A proud moment for Art and the WDM. That same year, Art was recognized by the PTC as their Volunteer of the Year.

Something that Art loves about the WDM is the opportunity to meet so many interesting people – whether they are other volunteers or Museum visitors. For many years, Art and Dorothy ran the PTC Cook Car, a place where volunteers could take a break and have a snack during busy Pion-Era weekends. Art loved being able to provide volunteers with homemade food and a place to gather.

In 1992, Dorothy became a member of the Boomtown Volunteer Association (BVA), a group of volunteers that help with events and projects. Art joined one year later. He took part in many BVA activities including the "Sparks Crew," a group of volunteers who prepared Sparks for mailing. As Art put it, "they had a great time visiting while helping the WDM."

Art has encountered thousands of visitors over the years as a Museum interpreter and tour guide. He could be found helping with school programs as a shopkeeper in Boomtown, helping with hands-on activities or leading tours. No matter the task, for over 50 years Art has brought a positive attitude and joy of helping to the WDM. When asked what his favourite part of the WDM is, Art couldn't pick just one. But he did say that for he and Dorothy, "The WDM has been a big part of our lives." Thank you to Art for all he has done for the WDM. He's been a big part of life at the WDM Saskatoon tool

My WDM Story with Blake Martin, Willow Bunch

"When can we go again?"

As we reflect on 75 years of the WDM, we think about the ways the Museum connects with you – our supporters. We are pleased to share a few of your stories in *Sparks*. My WDM Story with Chellan (Shelann) Hoffman, Calgary, Alberta

"Operation Stook"

In our last issue of Sparks, we featured Chellan (Shelann) Hoffman's connection to the WDM Yorkton. In this issue, Chellan shares her story of determination and triumph in the stooking competition at the Threshermen's Show and Seniors' Festival.

"Before I get into my story about stooking, I must explain that I am an only child, and therefore the keeper of all family memorabilia. Additionally, I am the child of Threshermen Club members, so have all sorts of photos and files plus my parents' trophies. Yes — trophies! I had never won a trophy but for decades I have had to look at the 'His' and 'Hers' stooking trophies on their shelf, and now my shelf. One day, I took a closer look at one of my mom's trophies. It was dated '1979.' I did the math. Mom would have been 49 years old when she won it. I started to calculate. This was 2017 and I was turning 50 later in the year. I was still 49 this summer. Bingo! I was going to try to win a trophy just like my mom did. And so began 'Operation Stook.'

My husband and I arrived in Yorkton on August 6, 2017. I was a little nervous. I had never actually stooked but had watched my parents compete. I stood at the end of a line of sheaves, psyching myself up to assemble six stooks. I was wearing my dad's Threshermen's vest and hat for luck. Suddenly from the loud speaker I heard, 'Hey Chellan!' It was Carla, the manager of the WDM Yorkton — and yes, we were both Thresher-Kids and knew each other. Carla announced, "Chellan is the daughter of long-time members, Doreen and Ernie Hoffman, who were really involved in the Threshermen's Club. Good luck, Chellan!" My husband thought this was hilarious that

someone from Calgary could show up to a stooking competition in Yorkton and be 'known.'

I was placed in the second heat, so I watched as someone younger than me and with more arm muscles, stepped up to the line of sheaves. She fashioned six stooks in an impressive amount of time. Then it was my turn. The whistle blew and I started. I tried to make the tidiest, upright stooks I could. Out of breath, my time was good enough for second place. And guess what? The WDM gave out a trophy for 2nd place! I was in tears. I had won my first trophy. I returned to Calgary, excited to share my trophy with my 87-year-old mom.

In 2018, I returned to the Threshermen's Show, hoping to win first place. But I made a strategic error. I brought my cousin's daughter along for the ride, and she decided to compete. She was younger, taller and stronger than I'll ever be. We both fell into the '65 and under' category and so Jessika Guse, descendant of Threshermen's Club members, beat me by two seconds. I graciously accepted my second-place trophy, again.

It's 2023. I'm now in my mid-50s and had a new mission. My mom had passed away in 2020, and 2023 marked the centennial year of my dad's birth. What better reasons to pay tribute to them by giving the stooking competition another try? I was the only one competing in my category on Saturday. There was another round on Sunday, but since we had to head back to Calgary, I didn't know how it would end. A few weeks later, I couldn't stand the suspense. I phoned the WDM. Carla was able to report that, even though there were two competitors on Sunday, I had the fastest time for the Women's and Men's 'under 65' category.

A week later I received my first-place trophy in the mail! I've had to start a new shelf for our family trophies. Mission accomplished."



Saskatchewan Sari-Sari: Filipino Roots, Prairie Growth

Featuring Filipino-Canadian Community History

The WDM is proud to partner with the Filipino-Canadian Association of Saskatchewan (FILCAS) to showcase Filipino-Canadian heritage and history. Visitors to the WDM Saskatoon can learn about the history of the Filipino-Canadian community in Saskatchewan through artifacts and stories on exhibit from community members who arrived in Saskatchewan from the 1960s onwards.

FILCAS is the registered, non-profit umbrella organization serving the Filipino-Canadian community in Saskatchewan. Established in 1973, FILCAS recently celebrated 50 years of connecting and supporting the over 44,000 Filipinos living in Saskatchewan. Their community history showcase is a tangible reminder of the long history of Filipino immigration and settlement in Saskatchewan.



In Filipino culture, sari-sari means "variety" and is commonly used to describe the small neighbourhood retail store that is a staple in communities throughout the Philippines. Not only do these stores provide a variety of convenient goods, but also serve as social hubs helping to build community. "The sari-sari store is a symbol of the Filipino spirit of community support," says FILCAS Co-President, Jenelyn Santos Ong, "it's only fitting that we mark the end of our year-long celebration of FILCAS's 50th anniversary by showcasing the immigration journey and contributions of Filipino-Canadians in Saskatchewan."

"The WDM is thrilled to provide museum support to FILCAS to help increase representation for more of Saskatchewan's people in the Museum," says WDM Chief Curator – Director of Collections & Research Elizabeth Scott.

Visitors can find the FILCAS community showcase exhibit, Saskatchewan Sari-Sari, in the east wing of the WDM Saskatoon – Come and join us to celebrate and learn about Filipino culture and history in Saskatchewan.

WDM MOOSE JAW

1903 Ford Model A Runabout

WDM-1973-S-220

The Ford Motor Company produced their first automobile in 1903 - a two-cylinder Model A. The WDM's Model A was one of the first 650 produced. Unfortunately, it was in poor condition when it was donated. In the 1950s, the WDM rebuilt it using the original chassis, motor and one fender.

Little is known about its history in Saskatchewan. In 1956, former Curator George Shepherd noted that, "Ford of Canada has no record of a Model A of 1903 being imported by the company." We do not know if it was purchased new in Detroit, USA or came to Saskatchewan second-hand. No matter how it got here, it is a rare, excellent example of an early automobile.

Dentist Office

According to the College of Dental Surgeons of Saskatchewan, dentistry followed the movement of settlers into western Canada. In 1886. brothers Lorenzo and William Keown set up practice in Regina and were two of the earliest registered dentists to practice in the area that would become Saskatchewan. Later, Lorenzo would move to Moosomin where he practiced for 50 years. The Keown brothers, and dentists like them, brought vital dental care to Saskatchewan in the late 19th and early 20th centuries. They likely used equipment like that found in the Dental Office in the Heritage Farm and Village.

Jail

WDM-1973-S-3998

In October 1914, a Royal North West Mounted Police (RNWMP) detachment was set up in Watson. From this detachment, two officers were assigned to patrol a 3,100 square kilometre area. In December 1914, Watson Town Council approved a payment of \$135 to the Canadian Iron Goods Co. to purchase a steel cell. In 1916, the detachment was closed as officers left to serve in the First World War. The area was then served by the Provincial Police Service from Humboldt and Wadena and a town constable was hired. This jail cell was used in Watson until it was donated to the WDM in 1971. It is on display in the RNWMP building in Boomtown.

Cabbage Patch Doll

"Mob scenes, incredible line-ups, punching in the aisles – they're all part of Cabbage Patch fever." This is how an article in the December 2, 1983 edition of the Saskatoon StarPhoenix, described the Cabbage Patch Doll craze. While in Saskatchewan there were no known reports of fights to get one of these dolls there was definitely heavy demand. Major retailers in the province sold out weeks before Christmas. The appeal of the doll was that each was unique with distinct features and came with their own name, birthday and adoption papers.

Each WDM has a Cabbage Patch doll on display in the 100 Years of Saskatchewan History and A Saskatchewan Story exhibits. This Cabbage Patch Doll, named Emanuel Lewis, resides at the WDM Yorkton.
