During their April 2019 meeting, the Board of Directors continued to refine the WDM's Ends policy to bring further clarity to the results the WDM is expected to achieve. Our Ends policy is an important part of the Board's work and serves as the foundation for our strategic and operational plans. Our new Ends policy states the following:

Major End: A Saskatchewan where everyone belongs and histories matter.

Sub-Ends Statements:

- 1. People's lives are enriched by connecting with Saskatchewan's diverse histories.
 - 1.1 Saskatchewan people experience a sense of place and belonging because their histories are shared through the WDM.
- 2. Inclusion and diversity are integral to the sustainability of the WDM.
 - 2.2 The WDM is committed to being an inclusive and diverse organization.

Diversity is everything that makes us unique as individuals and is intrinsic to who we are. It includes characteristics such as cultural background and ethnicity, age, gender, gender identity, gender expression, sexual orientation, abilities, indigenous status, immigration status, religious beliefs, language and education. Diversity also includes characteristics such as professional skills, working style, location and life experiences. Inclusion is an environment where everyone is valued, respected and involved – including people who might otherwise be excluded or marginalized.

Inclusion is diversity in action. It's about recognizing the needs of each individual and having the right conditions so that each person can achieve their full potential. Doukhobor Living Book Project: 120 Years in Saskatchewan

2019 marks the 120th anniversary of Doukhobors arriving in the area that would become Saskatchewan. Originally from Russia, the Canadian government resettled nearly 7,500 Doukhobors fleeing religious persecution. The WDM is pleased to partner with Spirit Wrestler Productions' *Doukhobor Living Book Project* to tell the story of the Doukhobors of Saskatchewan in a unique soundscape and exhibit, running June 29 - October 20 at the WDM Saskatoon.



The Doukhobor Living Book Project tells the story of how Saskatchewan's Independent Doukhobors practice their faith with a 'Moleniye' (prayer service). It captures the oral history of Doukhobor elders and explores how the community has evolved since first immigrating to Saskatchewan. The project consists of three components: a documentary film, an immersive soundscape created by Spirit Wrestler Productions and an exhibit produced by the WDM.

This immersive soundscape and exhibit allows visitors to experience a 'Moleniye.' Multiple audio and video tracks create a 360-degree auditory and visual experience as people move through the soundscape. Outside the soundscape, visitors can learn about Doukhobor history in an exhibit produced by the WDM, in partnership with the University of Saskatchewan's Dr. Ashleigh Androsoff and Spirit Wrestler Productions. The exhibit features artifacts that help illustrate Doukhobor history. Onya Kabaroff's wedding dress and Alex Nemanishen's linen suit are two such artifacts.

ONYA KABAROFF'S WEDDING DRESS

In 1899, Onya and Fedyor Perehudoff travelled with thousands of others of Doukhobor faith to land set aside for them in Western Canada, 32 years earlier. when Onya Kabaroff wore this wedding ensemble for her marriage to Fedyor Perehudoff, there was no way of knowing that a new home in Canada was in their future. Likely made by her mother, the wool and linen of this garment were homespun, while the cotton and other fabrics were purchased on an annual trip to a larger town. Onya and Fedyor, whose anglicized names became Anna and Fred, settled in the small Doukhobor village of Ospennia, near present-day Blaine Lake. Most Doukhobors adopted a Canadian style of clothing not long after coming to Canada. Onya, like most Doukhobor women, continued to wear her traditional outfit throughout her life for Sundays and special occasions.



ALEX NEMANISHEN'S LINEN SUIT

Like the Perehudoff's, 11-year-old Alex Nemanishen travelled to Canada in 1899 with his family. They settled in the small Doukhobor village of Kirilowka (Kirilowvla), near present-day Langham. Alex married Anastia Bludoff, a Doukhobor woman from the Veregin area around 1908. After a brief stint in British Columbia, the couple returned to Saskatchewan where Alex worked as a carpenter and saved money to buy his own land. In 1926, he purchased land close to where Kirilowka had been. By the time Alex died in 1971, traditions in Doukhobor communities had changed enough that he was not buried in this suit. This traditional Doukhobor men's suit was made for him by his wife Anastia and his mother-in-law in the early 20th century. Alex's mother-in-law took flax grown in their new fields in Canada and spun and wove it into linen.
